OLLI at University Park Reciprocity

OLLI University Park (UP) and OLLI York will allow members to sign up for courses at both OLLIs. Members must register for OLLI York or OLLI UP courses separately. To set up a reciprocal membership, please email **olli@psu.edu**. You must be an OLLI York member to register for any OLLI UP courses.

Course Confirmation

When registering online you will receive an instant email confirmation of registration and payment once your course registration is complete. Mailed registrations will receive an email confirmation once the noncredit registration office at University Park has received and entered your course registration.

You will receive another course-specific email confirming course details including date, time, and location the week prior to each in-person course. For online classes held via Zoom, you will receive an email with the Zoom link the day before the course.

Course Cancellation

Refunds for courses will be given in the form of credit only, no cash. Credit will only be given if you call the office at least one week before the start of the course. For a refund, multi-session courses must be cancelled for all sessions. Cancellation (with refund) for particular sessions is not allowed. At the end of each semester, all credits will be given back to you. If you registered with a credit card, you will receive a refund soon after you cancel a course. If you paid by check, you will receive a check shortly after the semester ends.

If you cannot attend a course for which you are registered, please call and let us know so we may add someone from the wait list. If you are on a wait list and a seat opens, our office will email and call the first person on the list. If we do not get a response within 48 hours, we will call the next person on the list.

Jack (Colin Firth), a wealthy Englishman with a country estate and a distaste for the obligatory social engagements that accompany his status, creates a fictional brother Ernest who lives in London, providing a convenient excuse to skip off to the city anytime he wants some fun. All is well until he falls in love with Gwendolen (Frances O'Connor), while in character as Ernest. Meanwhile, his best friend Algernon (Rupert Everett) pays an unannounced visit to the country home, pretending to be Ernest as a ruse to woo Jack's young ward Cecily (Reese Witherspoon). Confusion and hilarity ensue when Gwendolen also sets off for the countryside in search of Ernest and the women discover they are both in love with Ernest in this adaptation of Oscar Wilde's classic comedy of Victorian-era manners.

The adaptation stars Renée Zellweger as Bridget Jones, a 32-year-old British single woman, who writes a diary which focuses on the things she wishes to happen in her life. Her life changes when two men vie for her affection, portrayed by Colin Firth and Hugh Grant. Rated R for strong language and sexual situations.

The men become friends as they work together, and after his brother abdicates the throne, the new king relies on Logue to help him make his first wartime radio broadcast upon Britain's declaration of war on Germany in 1939. Based on the 2009 investigative book by BBC correspondent Martin Sixsmith, *The Lost Child of Philomena Lee*, the film focuses on the efforts of Philomena Lee (Judi Dench), mother to a boy conceived out of wedlock, something her Irish-Catholic community didn't have the highest opinion of, and given away for adoption in the United States. In following church doctrine, she was forced to sign a contract that wouldn't allow for any sort of inquiry into her son's whereabouts. After starting a family years later in England and, for the most part, moving on with her life, Lee meets Sixsmith (Steve Coogan), a BBC reporter with whom she decides to discover her long-lost son. 
