What is Critical Race Theory? with Laura West Steck, Ph.D.

Thursday, December 85:00 p.m.Free and Online via Zoom.Registration required.

This lecture will provide an overview of an area of legal scholarship referred to as critical race theory (CRT.) This body of literature first emerged within the field of legal studies in the 1980s and has since expanded into various other scholarly disciplines, including history, racial and ethnic studies, economics, political science, psychology, and sociology. Laura West Steck, Ph.D., will present the basic tenets of CRT, identify the place of CRT within other bodies of critical theory in the social sciences, and address why discussions of CRT have come to the forefront in so many public venues outside of academia in recent years. Steck will highlight current controversies surrounding CRT in political and educational settings, outlining opposing sides of the debate. She will also distinguish between CRT as a body of academic scholarship in higher education and the teaching of America's racial history from a critical thinking perspective in K-12 schools.



Presenter: Laura West Steck, Ph.D., associate professor of sociology, is a faculty member at York College of Pennsylvania (York College) in the School of Behavioral Sciences and Education. She graduated from York Catholic High School and went on to pursue a bachelor's degree in sociology and religious studies at Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP) as well as a master's degree in sociology at IUP. She completed her Ph.D. in sociology with a graduate certificate in Women's and Gender Studies at the University of Connecticut. Steck's areas of specialization include race, class, and gender inequality, family diversity, and medical sociology. She has been active with numerous organizations serving the York City School District, including Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Junior Achievement, and Communities in Schools. Steck has been a member of the York College faculty for the past sixteen years.

The remains of 800+ people, some whose identities are not known, rest under the surface of a grassy field in North York in unmarked graves - a cemetery dating back to the 19th century. When deceased people had no family, no financial means, or were unidentified, they would be interred in the City Cemetery, also known as Potter's Field or Penny Heaven. Interment here divided people socially and permanently, marginalizing the have-nots to the outskirts, often unidentified but not forgotten. Admiral Halsey's Campaign in the Solomon Islands in WWII

In the months after the attack on Pearl Harbor, Japan rapidly expanded its empire throughout the Pacific. In June of 1942, Japan started building an airstrip on Guadalcanal that, if finished, would allow the Japanese Navy to seriously threaten the supply lines between the United States and Australia. The United States decided to stop the Japanese at Guadalcanal. In the early months, the Allied campaign was not going well. When Admiral William Halsey took overall command, Allied fortunes reversed and the drive towards Tokyo began. This course discusses the leadup to the war and Halsey's campaign in the Solomons.



He is a nuclear engineer and patent attorney in private practice in Boalsburg, Pennsylvania and Nuangola, Pennsylvania.

Richard Bono is a former English major at Fordham University and lover of American literature. He is also an environmentalist and a *York Daily Record* columnist on nuclear power. He is an adviser for Clean Jobs for PA, and co-founder of York County Farm and Natural Lands Trust.

Peg Chown is a recovering attorney and former director of OLLI at Penn State York. Before OLLI, she was an assistant attorney general for the State of Minnesota, an Air Force JAG officer, taught law and politics at the graduate and undergraduate levels, and was dean of Extended Campus Programs at three universities.


